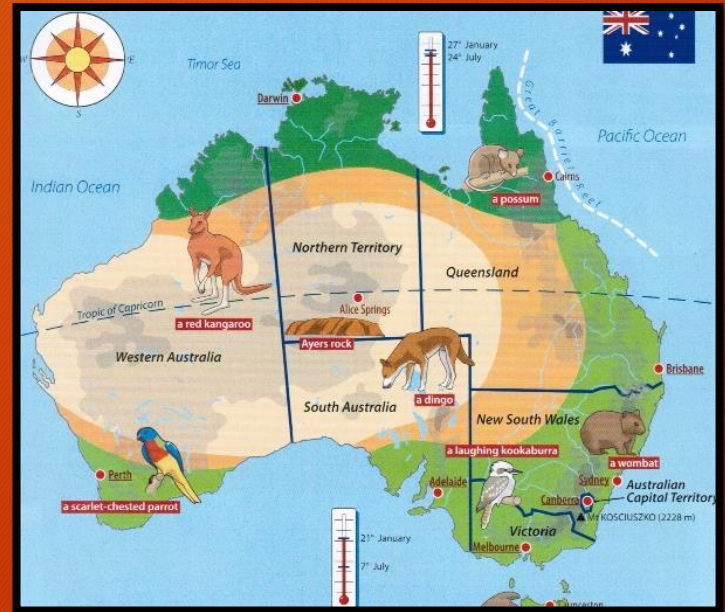

Timeline

1770: Captain Cook claimed Australia for Britain.

1788: 11 ships carrying 1,500 people (half of them convicts) arrived in Sydney.

1850s: gold-diggers and farmers took land from the Aborigines to build new towns.

1850-1900: half of the native population died (many killed by settlers or by imported diseases).

1901: the six Australian states became one nation.

1960s: all Aborigines were granted Australian citizenship and the right to vote.

1976: the Aboriginal Land Rights Act gave back many parts of the territory to the Aborigines.

1995: the Aboriginal flag was officially accepted by the Australian government.

Amazing facts about the country



AUSTRALIA

Australia is the only continent:

- that is also an island
- that has over 10,000 beaches

♦ It is the 6th largest country.

- ♦ It is the world's smallest and flattest continent.
- ♦ More than two thirds of the country is desert, called "the Outback."



♦ 80% of the population lives within 50 km of the coast.



♦ It is 14 times bigger than France.

Amazing facts about the people

The first people to live in Australia were the Aborigines. They have lived there for more than 40,000 years.



◆ In the 19th century, many British convicts were sent to Australia, a British colony at the time. A "First Fleet" of British ships arrived in Australia in 1788.

◆ Today, about 22% of Australians have a convict ancestor.

◆ About 25% of the population was born in another country.

◆ More than 10% of the population is of Asian origin.
